
Arriving at Atherstone, we were directed by Marshalls where to park. The town square was full by this time, (what time did they arrive)? Car hoods went up as it began to spit

### MY LIFE IN MGB's by Michael Tomkinson

I have spent the best part of my spare time during the last 50 odd years rescuing some 8 MGBs from an early demise, purely as a hobby. I have kept a record of all my cars over the years, thanks to a friend who I placed my insurance with, and presented me with a copy of my account, dating back to 1965 when I bought my first sports car, a 1953 Austin Healey BN1 convertible on my 22nd birthday. <u>No 1</u> 1966 MGB roadster GNW 847D



A 1966 MGB Roadster, reg . GNW 847D, bought as an abandoned project from a workmate, to my home in Enfield, North London, my wife driving the towing vehicle, a ford cortina mk1 GT, across London on a saturday afternoon.. nightmare experience ! (for her). The first year was spent getting the car roadworthy , with lots of welding and 2 new front wings. A night school course in Welding at Southgate Tech provided the necessary welding skills. My wife Patricia then claimed the car as her own, and commuted daily to her job in central london. Thankfully the car never let her down! In 1979. a job came up in Bahrain with me on loan to Cable and Wireless from British Telecom, the mg was put up on blocks in my garage for 4 years, with regular attention from a neighbour and friend to keep her healthy. Returning to the UK in 1984, the car was pressed into service again for Pat, as she had a job with a building firm (and family friend) looking after various building conversion jobs around North London. My elderly parents were now in different hospitals in Central London, and I was called in by the hospital to say goodbye to my dad, who was dying from cancer.

Pat came down to pick me up from the Post Office. Tower, and drove us to the nearby Middlesex Hospital. We parked outside on a meter, but on returning to the car an hour later, there was no clutch operation! The AA was called and took us home. This was Christmas eve, 1986. I decided then that the car must go, so a new clutch was fitted, and the car sold to a neighbour who drove it to his uncle in Naples, who fully restored it, and added it to his collection of classic cars. I still have the ignition key. maybe one day I will visit Naples......

<u>No 2</u> <u>1966 MGB/GT JDF 878D,</u> <u>1983 to 1986</u>



This car was a basket case when bought for £130 in 1983. Pat saw an AD in LOOT, and I virtually bought the car over the phone, restored the engine, and welded in complete cill assemblies both sides. A tricky task with an arc welder, as I couldn't afford a mig welder! The car was resprayed in Black cellulose, and trimmed out with off-cuts from our new smokey pink lounge carpet. After 3 years the car was sold to an engineering student who commuted daily to his college in Hatfield. Rough idlying was resolved by his tutor advising him to recondition the distributor.

The car was sold to him for £1400, after a 3 year restoration. Good money for 1986!

"Milly" 1994 to 1997



I rescued Molly from a rather sad end, slowly rusting away in the front garden of a the daughter of a neighbour. She failed the last MOT 2 years previously, daughter could not afford the repair costs, so the car was literally left to rot for 2 years, until her dad car dealer dad took charge, tried to get me to pay a premium price for this "worthwhile" project. Common sense prevailed after I pointed out the leaky hood had allowed rain ingress to collect and destroy the drivers side floor pan! The price was reduced by half, and the fragile car was carefully trailered home. Work started by removing buckets of rust and perforated lower front wing sections. A new drivers footwell was welded in, and cills on both sides replaced, as well as the lower half of the front wings. The chassis rails were ok, having been wax-oiled and under-sealed in previous years. Also those heavyweight bumpers were surprisingly sound, due to the thickness of the steel armatures (workshop manual description) inside. Cosmetically, a full retrim including beige leather seat covers and a burr walnut dashboard veneer was complemented by three coats of British Racing Green cellulose, and a new hood. The Rostyle wheels were silver and black hand painted in Hammerite, and a well earned Enfield Council MOT certificate obtained. Advertised In Classic Cars magazine, she sold well to TV production manager, who promised some TV exposure.

Another "LOOT" purchase found by my wife. A father and son abandoned project. The son was going to university, so dad sold her to me, complete with wire wheels, sunroof, and nasty DIY plywood dash. She was trailered home to Enfield, and started by ripping out the dash and fitting a new wiring loom and secondhand steel dash. Originaly white, the car was rubbed down and resprayed in bermuda blue, using the new 2 pack paint technology, protected by a laquer topcoat. The rusty wire wheels were stripped and the spokes re-finshed with Smoothrite silver. Whilst installing the new loom, I discovered a dynamo, rather than the expected alternator. Also, the door glasses were kite marked for 1967, so the cars registration, TNM554K, was not correct for a 1967 vehicle. On request, the DVLA issued an aged related registration, VYY 176E. I was so pleased with the blue paint job that I fitted ahome veneered burr walnut dashboard. I advertised the car in Classic Car magazine. A gentleman from Holland came over with his video camera, inspected the car, and said he would be in contact. A few days later he agreed the sale price, and I drove the car to Harwich for shipment to Holland. I left the paperwork and keys with the shipping agents, and caught the train home. A satisfying end to a 3 year restoration.

This sadly neglected MGB/GT reposed in the front garden of a neighbour, just opposite us, where we had a holiday chalet on the coast near Clacton. The owner lived in Spain, but spent a few weeks in the summer at his chalet, but the car spent the winters under a tarpaulin in his front garden, so he had lost interest in the car, as he had bought a new Datsun Sports Coupe. I made tentative enquiries, invited to "have a good look underneath". I was pleasantly surprised by the sound underseal, with only surface rust on the exposed suspension. She started up ok, but the manifold joint to downpipe was blowing, an easy fix...hopefully ! Anyway, the engine its self run ok, very quiet in fact...the 35k miles on the odometer seemed to reflect the cars seasonal use, but the only obvious rust was the door bottoms. Even the boot, surprisingly, was solid. £300changed hands, and the car transported home to Enfield. A light restoration was started, which required new door bottoms to be welded in, and the leading edge of the bonnet cut out and replaced, This required some delicate welding work with my trusty MIG welder. The car was then refinished in Old English White cellulose, new carpets fitted, nice stereo/cd player, and a trouble free MOT obtained. The car was advertised on the internet, and sold to an Irish Tarmac contractor, as an anniversary a present for his wife. The car was collected on one of his lorries, and shipped to Antim in Eireland, where it is still in daily use.

No 6: 1967 MGBGT LHJ 980E : 1996 to 1998



Bought from a friend of my daughter, who was a self employed mechanic, working from home ie front garden or in the road .He had taken a mgb rolling bodyshell in part payment of an outstanding bill on an another motor, and needed to pass it on...to me. No room in the front garden!the shell was trailered home, with all loose panels etc , included. For I think £200.most welding repairs had already been completed, so a respray and retrim was all that was required to finish the restoration. The original teal blue paintwork was over-coated, new grey velour carpeting installed,thank s to end of roll bargain from a local carpet shop. The sunroof covering was replaced, a massive learning experience! The wire wheels spokes were give a fresh coat of silver smoothrite enamel, anda full service before a council MOT was obtained, and the car sold on locally, for £2600, giving a small profit, labour hours given for free! But another MGB back on the road!

No 7: 1972 MGBGT FPG 822J Restored 1988 to 1991



This car was bought from the owner of a stables in Cuffley. Hertfordshire. He did not have the enthusiasm to do do the welding work necessary to pass an MOT. The car was full of rust in the usual places, ie cills and floor, and was burning oil. But she had a good interior, and a Webasco sunroof. The engine had a Weber twin choke carb fitted, rather than the usual twin Sus. The engine was reconditioned with new rings and bearings, and the newly repaired bodywork was resprayed in British Racing Green cellulose. A new MOT was obtained, and the car sold to a fellow manager in British Telecom, who omitted to tell his wife of the purchase! He ran it for a year, then citing the Weber twin choke DCOE carb's petrol consumption, as a reason to sell, and traded it in for a Fiat Tipo, in order to appease his wife!

No 8 1976 MGB GT VOV 228S



Having moved up to Burbage from London, I spent a year refurbishing our bungelow, sold off all my workhop and settled down to a country life, until Codvid struck and took my wife of 55 years. Pats doctor in London phoned me to check on my health, and asked me what I was doing in my spare time., and suggested that I change my focus on life, and return to my old hobby, restoring MGBs,


