

We had a very pleasant run home with the hood down all the way. A nice day out.



Derbyshire Dales Trail



We left home just after 9:00am on Saturday morning on our journey north to Darlington, arriving just after 2:00pm.

We stayed overnight at the Hall Garth Hotel (not recommended) just north of Darlington.

Next morning we took an early breakfast and set out for Romanby Golf Club, Northallerton, where the run started.

There were 45 cars on the run, mainly, but not exclusively MGs. We registered and had our complimentary coffee and biscuit before starting our 86 mile run around North Yorkshire. The first few miles to Leyburn were along normal roads but from then on the scenery on the moors and dales was spectacular. Many of the roads were single track and at one point we met a coach coming the other way. I had to reverse about 100 yards to a passing point and then we were on our way again. We passed through Middleham, the childhood home of Richard III, Appletreewick, famous for the national ferret racing championships and Pateley Bridge, among others, before returning to the starting point. We then went outside for the presentations. Jaguar Breakfast Meet - September 2022


Jaguar owners are invited to meet at the British Motor Museum, Gaydon on the first Saturday of the month for breakfast. This particular meet was a special one as it is 100 years since the start of the Swallow Side Car Company which later became Jaguar.

Friends Dave and Rosemary own a 2000 Jaguar S type, so calling on them and leaving our MG at their house we headed along to the museum. The weather was perfect for the many Jags and Daimlers who turned up and for the classic and vintage cars which were brought out of the museum especially.

Not having a Jag, we haven't gone to a lot of these breakfast meets however at one meet, we bumped into old friends from our Start Trek fan days Ann and Alan. Seeing Alan from a long way off it was the long hair and beard that made me wonder if it was him, albeit a lot greyer these days. What confirmed it was his Klingon t-shirt!

For sale at this years Goodwood Revival, (expected £70-£90,000)

An MG, prototype No. EX234, built in 1965 as a possible replacement for the MGB.

This car is another one of the fascinating 'might have beens' in the history of MG. Its planning began in 1964 when engineering brains at Abingdon's turned to a 'next generation' MGB that would have a better chassis. The new car incorporated the independent rear suspension that was intended for the original 'B' but abandoned as it was too expensive. The BMC parts bin was raided for the 1,275cc A-Series 'cooper' engine and gearbox. The suspension is upper and lower wishbones all round and fitted with Hydrolastic suspension units. The steering is rack and pinion, and there are disc brakes on all four wheels.

Once completed, the rolling chassis was despatched to Pininfarina in Italy for body styling. The result of the master coachbuilder's input was it contains hints of the FIAT 124 Sport Spider and Alfa Romeo Duetto, while at the same time incorporating the sawn-off 'Kamm' tail that would later appear on the Alfa Romeo 1750. The EX234 was intended to replace both the Midget and the MGB, and despite being more compact, it offered a more generously sized interior. The prototype has a removable roof section to demonstrate a GT/roadster versions, leather seats and a more up market dashboard. It has a very familiar look but overall, it isn't a bad looking car.

Although well received by some experts including John Surtees, this design did not progress any further. At the time of its inception both the Midget and the MGB were still selling well, as far as producing a new sports car were concerned it was felt by senior management that there was no need for a replacement. The project was shelved following BMC's merger with Leyland to form British-Leyland, the balance of power shifted in favour of Triumph. When the time came it was the Triumph TR7 that was chosen, despite the MG marque's greater popularity in the USA that was B-L's most important export market.
